Principal's Update

When our school officially closed on March 17, 2020, we did not realize how the COVID-19 pandemic would impact the world. The COVID-19 pandemic has created a truly unprecedented time

that has affected us all in many ways, especially education.

From the moment we were shut down, we began to develop strategies that would allow for continuous opportunities for our students to learn. Due to our school having a focus on innovative technology, our staff immediately started virtual instruction. Our staff utilized a plethora of instructional strategies, including conducting lessons to students via Zoom, assigning schoolwork and providing feedback to students via the Schoology software, and conducting virtual class organizational meetings.

Our students maintained their focus on academic achievement during the remote instructional period and continued to earn credits towards graduation. Our students **Demanded More**, **Expected More** and **Achieved More** during this challenging time.

Due to the dedication and persistence of our staff and students, we continued to meet school-wide performance goals.

I am excited to share the following points regarding the **Class of 2020**:

- our scholarship dollars awarded reached \$1,427,740;
- our students will be attending 19 different colleges across the nation;
- our unofficial graduation rate reached **89.3**%!

As we begin to plan for next school year, we are excited to increase our **Advanced Placement** course offerings to six. This will continue to allow our students to be enrolled in college-level courses as we look to challenge our students in class, each and every day.

Our school has been awarded a P-TECH grant, which in total will surpass \$2,300,000 over a six-year period. Although we have been awarded the grant, the total amount of the grant may change due to the economic impact of COVID - 19. We will have a planning year during the 2020 - 2021 academic school year, with implementation beginning during the 2021 - 2022 academic school year.

This grant will allow us to implement an Early College High School Program. The P-TECH grant integrates high school and college coursework, enabling students to begin college courses while in high school. Students will also participate in a range of workplace opportunities that include mentoring, site visits and paid internships, which are designed to support students' academic and professional growth.

We will be welcoming over 100 new Freshmen to our school as we continue to increase student enrollment and our school becomes a destination for students throughout the City of Buffalo.

On behalf of our faculty, staff, and students, I would like to thank the Bennett Alumni Association for their continued support!

News From Our President



I want to share with you the reason for my passion for Bennett High School...

In 1953, my twin sister and I graduated from Public School #74. At that time we resided at 27 Hamlin Road. All of our classmates who were white were told their high school would be Bennett. Any student of color would be sent to East High School. Because my sister and I are Black, we were to go

to East. Needless to say, we were very, very disappointed. All of our friends who lived in our neighborhood and were white got to go to Bennett.

"This was not acceptable for us. It was not fair. They can't do this to us." were our cries.

But what could we do about it? There had to be a way for us to attend Bennett! Bennett High School was the best high school that the city had to offer. We knew many accomplished people had graduated from there.

So, we put together a plan! My mother would go to AM&A's and buy a housedress and pretend she cleaned homes of some of her wealthy friends that lived in the Hertel Avenue area. She would claim she needed to drop her twin daughters off at school before she went to work and that she would need to be able to pick them up on her way back home.

At that time, Dr. Benjamin Willis was the Superintendent of the Buffalo Schools. Some of my mother's friends knew him and suggested that this would work. It was important that she begged for his help because she was so poor and needed these jobs to feed her family.

It worked! My sister and I loved our high school years at Bennett and we made many friends that we still communicate with today!

The History of Bennett High School

INSTALLMENT ONE - THE BEGINNING

Lewis Jackson Bennett was an entrepreneur who moved to Buffalo and founded a cement company. As his business grew, he needed to access more raw materials. The location he found to excavate the stone for his cement was on E. Amherst Street. The Amherst Street Quarry was used to exhaustion and has since been converted to McCarthy Park.

Beyond his business, Lewis J. Bennett wanted to build a community. He purchased acres of land, which became and is still known as Central Park. The street boundaries are Hertel, Main, East Amherst, and Starin.

Main Street was a dividing line between Mr. Bennett's cement company and the community he was developing. He was a shrewd businessman. Any home buyer wanting to build west of Main Street would use stone from the quarry east of Main St-- both of which were purchased from Mr. Bennett.

Another mark left by this visionary was the naming of area streets. Woodbridge and Benwood are tributes to Mr. Bennett's son-in-law, who died at an early age.

There was a threat to Mr. Bennett's vision, however. There was talk of the railroad cutting right through his Central Park land. He had an idea. Give a large parcel of land on Main Street to the City to have the Board of Education build a school and, eventually, a stadium.

It was no surprise that there was a controversy between the City and the School District. The Mayor did not want to build a stadium. He thought that the parcel of land was too small. His alternate site was near Edward J. Meyer Memorial Hospital. Overcrowding at Hutchinson Technical and Lafavette made the need to accept the property more urgent than the Mayor's objection. To tip the balance in favor of the Main Street site, the local businessmen's association, The Mercer Club, lobbied and prevailed. The stage, then, was set for the building of a high school and the future All High Stadium. The Mercer Club would continue to support the school and its students until its dissolution close to the end of the 20th century.

With the land in place, a design had to be made. The Board of Education hired Buffalo Associate Architects, of which E. B. Green was a partner. Ernest Cremi developed the design. The style of the building is Georgian Revival. It is modeled after London's Buckingham Palace. (to be continued in the next <u>Beacon</u>).
