<u>E</u><u>ducation isn't what it used to be</u>. <u>Kids are failing in record</u> <u>numbers. Teachers are ineffective at best</u>. <u>The dropout rate</u> <u>is skyrocketing</u>. <u>Parents are part of the problem</u>. <u>Schools are</u> <u>places of bullying and conflict</u>. <u>American students can't com-</u> <u>pete</u>. This is how most of the media portrays our schools.

Take a closer look. It isn't our students, parents or teachers who are failing the system; it is the system that is failing them. Federal, state and local school boards have pushed the panic button and have instituted inflexible tests and evaluations in a quick fix effort to correct perceived inadequacies. These proposals are meant to enrich classroom instruction or provide opportunities that students would not normally be afforded during the regular school year.

Each Mini Grant can be up to \$500. The response from the faculty is tremendous, but, unfortunately, we are unable to fund every request. This school year, almost \$6000 was awarded.

Projects range from class sets of books to field trips to special science materials to club funds for art, music and others.

Remembering Gerald D. Berkman

The Bennett community mourns the January 9, 2014 death of longtime teacher and coach Gerald D. Berkman. Jerry, age 78, died of cancer in Tampa, Florida after a long battle with the dreaded disease. Jerry had a 30 year teaching career in the Buffalo Public Schools starting at P.S. #33. He was then assigned to Bennett in 1964 from where he retired in 1990. During his tenure at BHS, Berkman taught Health and Physical Education and coached Football as Assistant and Head Coach, Track, Baseball, Basketball (girls and boys), Cross Country, Bowling and Swimming.

Among his many coaching successes, Jerry was most successful in baseball where his teams captured the Cornell Cup in five different seasons. Jerry was enshrined in the Bennett Sports Hall of Fame in 2006, as well as the Harvard Cup Hall of Fame a few years later.

Jerry had a remarkable career as an athlete. He was first team All High quarterback and record holder in football out of Burgard in 1952. He then signed a professional baseball contract with the Philadelphia Phillies and rose to the level of Double A ball, playing for the Durham Bulls. After two years he returned home to attend the University of Buffalo.

Jerry will always be remembered for his tough, no nonsense style, and mostly for the high moral, ethics and dedication he brought to the job everyday. His colleagues will also recall the great sense of humor he brought to work every day.
