Starting in September 2023, Bennett students and staff will be able to use the entire building. Your

It comes as no surprise that we are passionate about public education and particularly education at our beloved Bennett High School. It's also no surprise that we are well organized to advocate for Buffalo Public School students. Our success at turning the tide came in 2013, when the District seemed headed to close Bennett High School and turn the building over to two charter schools. This speaks volumes about our organization's ability to advocate. One of our major strengths is our ability to partner with key decision-makers within the BPS on behalf of Bennett's staff and students. Our work involved many strategies:

#### 1. Advocacy for public school students

We substantiated the need to expand the Lewis J. Bennett High School program allowing access to this successful high school to the hundreds of 8th-grade students who had to be turned away due to space constraints. More importantly, we highlighted the safety issues involved with having three different high schools on one campus. Each school had its own bell schedule, making it a challenge to access gymnasiums, cafeterias, library and auditorium. Athletes were required to travel to and from school late in the evening for athletic practices. Home contests had to be held at alternate locations. Because there were three separate schools, not every student could be well known by every staff member. We invested in Bennett's future by sustaining the District's attention on all of these important issues.

# **2. Building strategic relationships with District "decision makers" for change**

Through dogged persistence and multiple changes in District leadership, the Alumni Association Redesign Team coordinated meetings with

District personnel around the issue of space utilization, ensuring that key players were at the table for regular dialogue. We asked difficult questions about student safety and cited ongoing issues around gymnasium use and sports practices and contests. Whenever possible, we offered possible solutions, but most importantly, we kept the focus on our vision, enabling Bennett students to utilize the entire facility.

#### 3. Raising Awareness through Communication

The Redesign Team authored multiple letters and emails to Board of Education members, the superintendent and other leaders, highlighting our concerns and emphasizing the fact that the number one obstacle to the future of our successful program is classroom space. It wasn't long before students and their families heard the good news about Lewis J Bennett's graduation rate and other successes. Hundreds of student applicants had to be turned away each year due to lack of space. Your Alumni Association members actively pursued multiple opportunities to speak out at Board of Education Meetings. After these public appearances, we were often rewarded with in-person meeting dates during which we could bring our concerns to the attention of District personnel involved in these decisions, thus raising the level of awareness and accountability.

#### 4. Monitoring Progress

We continue to meet with District leaders to monitor the process of enrolling new students and expanding staff and budget allocations. We are in continuous dialogue with Bennett staff and students so that we can be responsive to ongoing issues and apply steady pressure to the levers of change.

#### 5. Celebrating Successes

At our April meeting with District leaders, the move of Middle Early College from the Bennett Campus was confirmed. We stopped briefly to pat ourselves on the back to acknowledge our hard work and success, but then immediately set to work on ensuring a smooth transition as Lewis J. Bennett's enrollment increases.

# News From Our Principal



am excited to share that our Class of 2023 has earned an unofficial graduation rate of 87%. This graduation rate, will once again, surpass the Buffalo Public Schools average graduation rate and likely

will surpass the average graduation rate for New York State. Our students are achieving prominent levels of academic success due to the work of our teachers and non-instructional personnel. Our Class of 2023 accumulated just over two million dollars in scholarships money and students will be attending 27 colleges and universities across the country.

We are excited to share that our 11<sup>th</sup> grade PTECH students will have an opportunity to experience taking college classes on campus this year. Many of the PTECH incoming juniors have already earned several college course credits while taking classes on our campus. They are now prepared to complete additional courses on the campus at Erie Community College. We continue to be extremely excited about the collaboration and support provided by Erie Community College and IBM.

We will be welcoming 142 new freshmen to our school during our Freshman Orientation in August. In addition, we will also be hosting a three-day Summer Bridge Academy for our incoming PTECH Freshmen. This will be the first summer in which our older PTECH students will be working side by side with our incoming PTECH students during the Summer Bridge Academy. The goal is for our older students to be able to mentor and support our younger students as they transition into a rigorous high school academic program.

We will also be adding two Advanced Placement courses for this academic school year. Students will have an opportunity to enroll in Advanced Placement Statistics as well as Advanced Placement Seminar. Our Advanced Placement offerings have increased to nine. It is hard to believe that five short years ago, we did not offer any Advanced Placement courses. Providing our students the opportunity to take these challenging courses will allow our students to be enrolled in college-level courses and earn college credits while in high school.

Our school continues to grow and is becoming a school of destination in the City of Buffalo. We will resume our pursuit of having 700 - 800 students enrolled as we regain classrooms within our school building. I am excited to share that this Fall, we expect to recapture the entire building!
