

Sanford Greenberg, '58 - 2025 Outstanding Alumni

he Bennett Alumni Association is pleased to announce the 2025 Centennial Outstanding Alumni of the Year - Sanford Greenberg, Class of 1958. Sandy is an inventor, author, public servant, and philanthropist best known for his efforts toward the goal of ending blindness. His induction will take place as a part of the 100th Anniversary Gala and Dinner at the Buffalo Convention Center.



In the Forward to Sandy Greenberg's book, Hello Darkness, My Old Friend, the late Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg writes, "a snapshot of Sandy in 1958 at age 17: brainy, athletic, president of his Buffalo, New York High School senior class, and of the school student council, trumpet player, a tall and all around good looking fellow. That year he entered Columbia College on full scholarship. There he thrived on learning, made lasting friendships and experienced the city's many wonders."

Flashback to Sandy at five years old when his father died suddenly; Sandy was now the man of the house, which included his brother, sister, mother, and grandmother who had immigrated to Buffalo from Poland in the early 20th century, "a survivor of Jewish ghettos, poverty, and pogroms."

Uncle Carl, his dad's brother. who also immigrated to Buffalo from Poland, married his widowed mother when he was ten. New financial stability enabled the family to buy a home in North Buffalo on Saranac Ave. and enjoy the opportunity to attend Bennett High School. Sandy worked in his uncle's junk business during summers. He met Sue Roseno, '58, who would later become his wife, in elementary school, where he joined "club after club," played ice hockey, baseball, and basketball, and played the trumpet because he thought it was "cool."

It was in his third year at Columbia that the trajectory of his life took an extraordinary turn. He had had episodes of blurry vision and

periods where he lost his sight, but they always resolved themselves until December of 1960. He was sitting for his finals at Columbia and had to walk out because he could not see. This was the beginning of a challenging life journey where he struggled with an internal conflict of

• Margaret Lanz Puzio, '68 & Faculty how he would thrive as a person without sight in a sighted world.

But thrive, he did! He is credited with so many remarkable accomplishments that place him in the top echelon of human achievement. In an ironic twist, the title of his book and the familiar Simon and Garfunkel line from *Sounds of Silence* came about because Art Garfunkel was his college roommate and became a lifelong friend.

Sandy Greenburg emphasizes how important his wife, Sue, his family, friends and colleagues are in composing the rich life he has lived in spite of the early tragedy of losing his eyesight. One quote from the book summarizes his ethos, "After a half century of thought, I've come to the conclusion that the only really worthwhile things in the world are people and ideas."

We know that we, along with other Bennett Alumni, look forward to meeting this very special Centennial Alumni recipient.

Alumni Funds for Library Improvements



Fondly Remembering Past President Dr. Len Katz



r. Leonard Katz,'53, was born on August 7, 1935 and died on February 6, 2025. He was a distinguished alumnus of Bennett High School. He often expressed deep gratitude for the education he received there, maintaining strong ties to the institution throughout his life. In the 1990s, when the Bennett Alumni Association was established, Dr. Katz took an active role, serving

on the Board of Directors and eventually being elected president. He was instrumental in initiating the Mini-Grant Program, which annually awards thousands of dollars for enhanced educational opportunities for our students.

Dr. Katz's professional achievements did not diminish his willingness to be part of his Bennett family. He remained humble and deeply connected to his roots. He never forgot his experiences as a student at Bennett High School and was committed to

Lewis J. Bennett (1833-1925) - Industrialist and Benefactor

[Bennett High School is named after Lewis J. Bennett, who donated the land for the school and for All High Stadium, as well as the land for three churches in Central Park. This is a biography about him.]

Personal Life

Mr. Bennett was a Universalist in religious belief and, although not a member of a church,



was a generous supporter of all. Politically, as may be inferred, he was a Republican. He was a charter member and first treasurer of Fultonville

Lodge No. 531, Free and Accepted Masons; a companion of Chapter No. 71, Royal Arch Masons, Johnstown, New York; and a Sir Knight of Apollo Commandery No. 15, Knights Templar, Troy, New York.

He was a life member of the Buffalo Society of Natural Sciences and of the Buffalo Historical Society, formerly holding official positions in both; plus a member of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. He presented the former society with a most valuable collection of fossils, which is exhibited at their rooms, the largest and most complete collection in the world.

He was also a member of the Buffalo Chamber of Commerce, and one of the 250 honorary trustees of the Lincoln Farm Association, organized to preserve the birthplace of President Abraham Lincoln.

Marriage and Family

e was married, in Johnstown, New York, on October 6, 1857, to the former Mary F. Spalding, who was born June 1,1840, daughter of Andrew and Emeline (Hamilton) Spalding of Johnstown, New York. They had two children:

* Leslie Bennett, born May 25, 1860, at Fultonville, New York, was educated in Buffalo common and high schools and a graduate of the State Normal College. He went on to become vice-president, secretary and assistant treasurer of the Buffalo Cement Company.

* Louisa A. Bennett, born May 16, 1868, married James P. Wood, of Buffalo on November 16, 1887. They had five children: Helen B., Frances L., Harriet A., Mildred V. and James B.

ocated adjacent to Parkside, Lewis J. Bennett developed the area north of the Belt Line Railroad known as Central Park.

On 200 acres west of Main Street and north of the Belt Line, Bennett began to develop a neighborhood in 1889. Two principal conditions for the development of the area were its proximity to the Olmsted & Vaux-designed Delaware Park and the completion of the 1860-1882 Belt Line Railroad, which enabled Buffalo to boast more train trackage than any city in world at that time. The only remaining station of the original 19 is at Starin & Amherst.

The boundaries of Central Park were Main, Woodbridge, Parkside, Linden, Starin and Amherst streets. Working with Charles Besch, Bennett himself plotted the location of the streets. Along the planned streets, they dug holes, blasted into the bedrock and planted elm trees. This initial preparation took four years and cost \$300,000 to complete. Originally, nineteen stone markers delineated the boundaries of the neighborhood.

On 20 May, 1892, Bennett formally signed the zoning ordinances which would shape the neighborhood. Deed restrictions more stringent than Buffalo's — e.g. no commercial R3 businesses and only one dwelling and one

barn per lot (with eleven exceptions) were allowed.

Zoning ordinances called for only single family homes being at least two stories in height with barns to be placed in the rear of all residences. He also outlined the minimum costs for all residences and zoned them according to what streets on which they would be located. Homes on Depew were to cost a minimum of \$4,000; those on Main, \$3,500; and those on Linden, \$2,500. To insure that large houses would be built, he provided free (large) foundations on corner lots

An integral part of the social life of the neighborhood was the Otowega Club. Located on Starin at Linden (now a vacant triangle), the building contained a bowling alley, billiard hall, card room, dance hall and dining room. Prior to its destruction in the 1940s, it served as the meeting place for residents and religious bodies organizing congregations in the community. Many of the streets in Central park were named after Bennett's family and friends.

Bennett built the first house in Central Park for himself. He hired prominent Buffalo architect Milton Beebe to design a 24-room house at 354 Depew, located just north of what is now named Burke's Green.

Burke's Green was originally an unnamed triangular piece of land with a fountain (dismantled in the 1920s and a new one installed in 2002), which was deeded to the city by Mr. Bennett to be used as a park. It was officially named Burke's Green in memory of F. Brendan Burke, a civic-minded Central Park resident in the 1960s. Although it is a city-owned park, the Central Park Association has maintained it since the 1960s.

Bennett's house was demolished in 1935 and replaced by 12 lots. Mrs. Bennett then moved to the Campanile Apartments.
